SPOTLIGHT ON LOCAL ENTERPRISE

Mention the name Buckland in these parts and we think of tree and forestry work. But now a younger Buckland in the shape of Martin, together with wife Frances, is farming Alpacas at Pennybridge Farm, along the Greywell Road in Up Nately.

Alpacas are related to camels and llamas and are more commonly found in Peru, Chile and Bolivia where they are bred for the fine fibre in their wool which rivals cashmere and mohair.

Martin and Frances came into this venture with no relevant experience, starting out in 2003 with two animals on land that had been in Martin's family for over 60 years. Today they have a herd of 27.

The main thrust of the business is breeding with Alpacas able to be traded for several thousand pounds each according to age and genetic heritage.

Alpaca breeding, while relatively new to this country, is increasingly seen as a viable business. These animals will not survive in a solitary situation but can be kept in small herds of three or more as field pets as an alternative to horses. They make great 'lawn mowers' for those with an acre or two of grazing land and are generally easy to look after. They can be halter-trained and will become quite tame; most will take feed from your hand or a bucket.

A secondary source of income is from the fibre: a mobile shearer visits once a year and the wool is spun and sold at fêtes and shows.

Last summer, Martin and Frances were at Newnham's Newfest together with two of their Alpacas, some of the spun alpaca wool and a selection of items sourced from a supplier who has a fair-trade policy with sellers in Peru.

They support the charity WAWA, which helps disadvantaged children in Peru. Closer to home, the proceeds of wool sales have contributed to St Stephen's roof fund.

The Spring is the start of the birthing season and around nine new additions are expected over the coming weeks.

A few sleepless nights, no doubt, for Martin and Frances!

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POLICE UPDATE

As spring approaches I wish to make residents aware of the usual types of crime that historically this area suffers from at this time of the year.

First garden sheds and outbuildings are targeted for lawn mowers and other garden equipment. A second season related problem is theft from cars parked in isolated rural areas while owners go out walking, usually when the bluebells are out. If you are leaving your vehicle in remote areas please make sure handbags are not placed under seats, sat navs left in glove compartments or laptops left in the boot (places thieves look). We are aware that criminals have a device that can detect such equipment in car boots. Conversely when laptop cases have been left in full view, criminals have broken into the car in the belief the computer is in the case and, although it is not, damage is caused to the car.

Concern about dogs worrying sheep is particularly acute during lambing time. In 2009 we had three reports of sheep worrying, one resulted in a lamb being killed and others put down, and two dogs were destroyed. Sadly when dogs do chase and injure sheep they will continue to do it. I ask dog owners to please keep their dogs under proper control when near livestock.

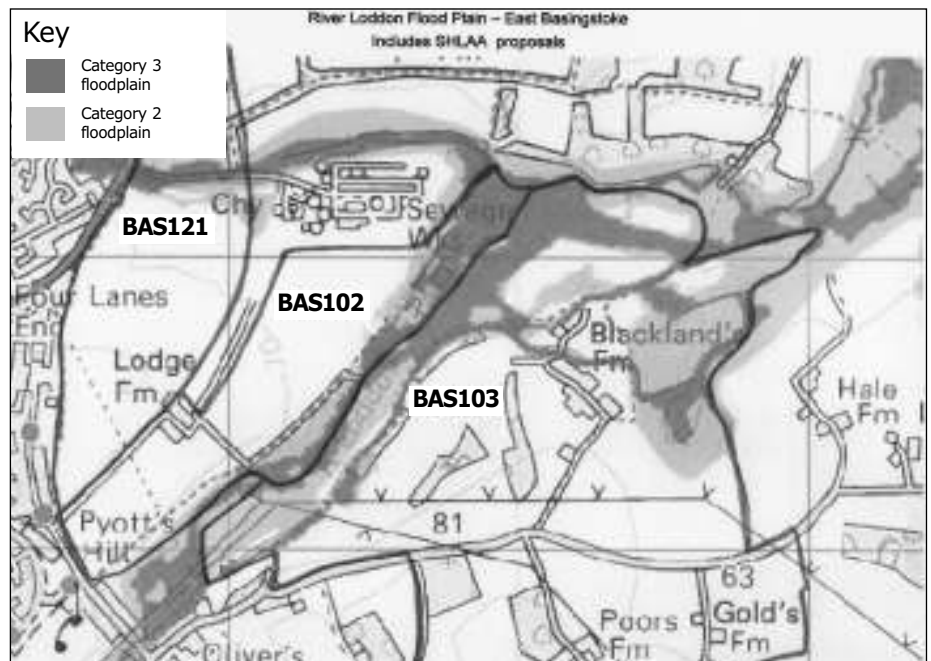

This month SOLVE has been busy contributing towards Borough Council policy documents.

'Delivering a Successful Future' - The Council Plan 2010-13 The latest draft does not include Natural Environment or the Council's duty to maintain and expand important wildlife habitats as a key priority. SOLVE has questioned whether the Council listened to the feedback received during consultation that 'environment should be a stated policy priority'. With the support of residents on our database Cllrs Cubitt and Godesen have proposed an additional priority be included in the draft...

'That the Council should protect, preserve, and (where possible) improve the natural environment in the Borough.'

This is now under consideration by the Council. Our thanks go to the people of Basing, Lychpit, Newnham, Chineham, Mapledurwell, Up Nately etc who emailed Councillor Cubitt in support of the amendment.

Living Landscapes - Landscape and Biodiversity Strategy This document helps form council policy relating to various areas of work

such as community engagement, management of council land, partnership working etc. The Council has sought views, via a questionnaire, on a draft revised strategy. Protecting and enhancing the quality of wildlife habitats and the landscape have been identified as high priorities; SOLVE has highlighted a number of issues relating mainly to the protection of the natural environment.

Strategic Biodiversity Assessment (SBA) This document is in preparation and key to protecting biodiversity in the Borough. It will be used as part of the Evidence Base for the Local Development Framework to help the Council determine where development should or shouldn't go. It will go to the planning committee and public consultation in March.

B&D Committee Debate on the SHLAA

B&D Planning and Infrastructure (P&I) Overview and Scrutiny Committee Meeting of Thursday 18th February

The Committee debated the Draft SHLAA; presentations were made by SOLVE and Country Watch.

EXTRACTS FROM SOLVE PRESENTATION

SOLVE believes that Sites 102, 103 and 121 (see map opposite) should be withdrawn from the SHLAA for the following reasons:

- Development in conflict with local, national and EU policy, guidance and legal obligations:
 - Environmental Agency
 - Established planning policies
 - Water quality
 - Habitat Directives
 - Biodiversity Action Plan
 - Groundwater Protection Zone
 - Green Infrastructure.
- There are established precedents for exclusion due to:
 - Flood Risk
 - Sites of national historic importance
 - Sites of national and international importance for environmental reasons
- The document recognised there has been 'Inadequate consultation.

FROM SOLVE REPORT ON THE MEETING

Councillors agreed with our presentation and the P & I Committee shared our concerns that the SHLAA in its current form had significant flaws.

Specifically Councillors agreed that the Planning Officers had not conducted adequate public consultation and that the document lacked democratic accountability.

As a result Councillors informed the Planning Officers the SHLAA was not acceptable and instructed them to embark on a more robust and proactive public consultation process.

Hats off to all the Councillors who volunteer to put themselves through this process... this really was a case of elected officials holding local government to account.

Thanks to all the SOLVE team for helping us present a rational and coherent argument. Kestrel FM and BBC Radio Berkshire ran interviews with us and the *Gazette* covered the meeting.

FROM COUNTRY WATCH REPORT ON THE MEETING

The Committee agreed that a SHLAA was needed.

Cllr Cubitt said that the draft SHLAA had no headroom in housing numbers and that by definition sites in the Loddon Valley would have to be developed first. The Council Officers must find additional Greenfield sites in order to give the LDF a choice of areas in which development could take place.

Country Watch proposed that the base for the final SHLAA should be the September 2008 version which included a major site south west of the town but not the large Poors Farm site in the Loddon Valley.

However Country Watch's proposal was rejected by Committee who recommended that:

- Officers produce an updated SHLAA (Version 3) based on the current draft version
- This would be sent to all Members and Version 4 agreed
- Version 4 would be sent to all interested organisations
- Following public consultation V5 to be sent to Members and 'challenge sites' would go before Committee for decision
- If Planning Officers maintain their advice on sites that are challenged then Corporate Director Karen Brimacombe would make the decision
- SHLAA would be signed off by Karen Brimacombe.

OUTCOMES

As a result of lobbying by SOLVE and Country Watch, Cllrs Cubitt and Godesen have proposed that a priority be included in The Council Plan 2010-13 to protect, preserve and where possible enhance the natural environment (see SOLVE report on facing page).

Cllrs Cubitt and Godesen (supported by Labour and Lib Dem Councillors) forced through a motion that 'Flood Plains Category 3 and 2' (shown on the map opposite) be excluded from the final SHLAA.

COUNTRY WATCH ACTION

Country Watch intends to engage Environmental Consultants to conduct a biodiversity study of the Loddon Valley covering the areas included in the draft SHLAA. This will provide a useful evidence base to defend the Valley against development particularly when the LDF looks at site selection.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

A3 Blackstocks Lane / Crown Lane Junction County Cllr Elaine Still has organised a meeting (as the *Villager* goes to press) with Highways and Police Traffic Officers, and the Parish Council, to discuss reducing the speed limit along this stretch of the A30, other safety aspects and issues raised by local residents. The tragic accident here will of course be at the fore of everyone's mind.

Proposed allotments in Blackstock's Lane on the Up Nately side of the M3. Meeting to be held on Monday evening 1st March (see *Mapledurwell and Up Nately Parish Council News*).

Crown Lane Signpost HCC Highways has an arrangement with the signs department of the AA to repair fingerpost signs. The Newnham Green fingerpost at the top of Crown Lane in on their schedule awaiting new April funding.

Speed Limit Reminder Sign (SLR) Results from the Newnham Road SLR speed recorder, Dec 2009-Jan 2010:

Week before SLR activated (commencing 2nd December 2009) (ave 32.63 & 38.68)

During deployment week 1 (ave 30.48 & 36.10)

During final week deployment (from 20th January) (ave 30.47 & 35.85)

Week after deployment (ave 32.03 & 37.70).

Figures indicate the average mean and 85th%ile respectively over the week.

The 85th%ile figures indicate the speed 85% of traffic was travelling below. The speed data shows that although the

average speed is reasonable there is still 15% of drivers exceeding the speed limit (without the SLR present) by least 8.68/7.7mph. This experiment supports received wisdom from elsewhere that the SLRs reduce speed by approx 2mph during their deployment, then it creeps back up to where it was before.

Newnham Hill Nursing Home The Parish Council has asked Richard Barwick of Cove Construction to provide timely information to residents via the *Villager*. Hopefully the *Villager* will in future be able to report in advance on developments at Newnham Hill such as the felling of the Oak tree at the site entrance. However it should be noted that the removal of the Oak was a requirement of Highways and covered by the application approval of 2006. No further notification or consultation with the Parish on the removal of the tree was officially required.

Natural Environment Forum (NEF) is one of the key forums within the Basingstoke Local Strategic Partnership (LSP). The LSP brings together representatives of individual organisations, companies and public bodies (police, schools, hospital). See the *natural environment page of the Borough website*.

Cllr Nigel Bell represented Newnham Parish Council at the NEF meeting of 29th January. A very positive aspect of the meeting was the attendance of Cllr Rob Golding, the cabinet member for Planning and Infrastructure. This is the second successive meeting he has attended since his appointment in July 2009.

Landscape and Biodiversity Strategy Mike Bird, Tree and Biodiversity Officer, gave an update on the Borough's Strategy (see the *Parish Council website for Newnham's response to the current draft document*).

Water Cycle Study Cllr Golding would like to receive critiques of the Study, emailed or posted directly to him.

The Council Plan 2010-13 consultation resulted in many requests that the Environment should be specified as a policy priority. The Cabinet is considering inserting this in the revised Council

Plan. There will be an opportunity to comment on the environmental aspects of the Local Development Framework (start date confirmed as March 15th).

Planning and Infrastructure Overview Committee Meeting on the SHLAA (Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment) (see pgs 3-4). Newnham Parish Council was represented at the 18th February meeting by Cllr Nigel Bell. The Parish Council would like to thank and congratulate SOLVE and Country Watch for their short presentations which backed each other up. The core of the Meeting was that:

1. A SHLAA is necessary for the preparation of the Borough's Core Strategy (this document is the key paper when generating the Local Development Framework).
2. The SHLAA should be a neutral, officer-led document for members to examine and adjust in open debate.
3. The SHLAA should consider all possible sites in the Borough and decide whether each passes the test of suitability, achievability and availability.
4. In drafting the SHLAA, there have been failures in assessing suitability, by overlooking environmental aspects such as landscape, biodiversity, flood risk, and failures to consult publicly over what was being done.

The risks of a badly prepared SHLAA are that the Core Strategy will be rejected by Central Government; the Borough will not have the required five-year housing land supply, and developers may win appeals by citing such inadequacies. It is essential Basingstoke has a sound SHLAA, supported by the Council and the public.

Category 2 and 3 flood plain areas are to be eliminated from the SHLAA (see *map, page 2*). This is a useful stepping stone, but we need officers to accept that ancient woodland SINC's must be protected, and that the hydrology of those woods and therefore the land around them must also be protected.

Local walks (1)

Huish House & Sheetland Copse from Mapledurwell

Approximate walk time 1 hour 30 minutes

To start the walk, enter Kembers Lane (an unmade lane) at the junction with Tunworth Road. Follow the lane west, past the Old Post Office, heading towards the motorway.

At the end of the lane, with Island Cottages on the right, there is a farm gate. On the left hand side of the gate there is pedestrian access leading onto a concrete farm track. Head towards the two large barns and follow the grass path running between the first barn and the row of trees.

Follow the path along the ridge separating the fields, which continues toward the motorway and footbridge. Do not go over the footbridge, but bear slightly left and follow the post and rail fence west for approximately 200 metres until the tree line begins. There is a small gap between the post and rail fence and the copse fence.

Follow the uneven path alongside the motorway, eventually crossing a wooden bridge over the river Lyde. After the bridge the pathway starts to even out slightly and is guided by wire fences on both sides, there is a magnificent line of horse

chestnut trees to the right. The pathway continues southwest until you reach a tarmac drive which leads southeast towards Huish House. Here, pathway signs point back the way you have come and also towards Huish House. Head southeast following the sign and driveway towards the main house.

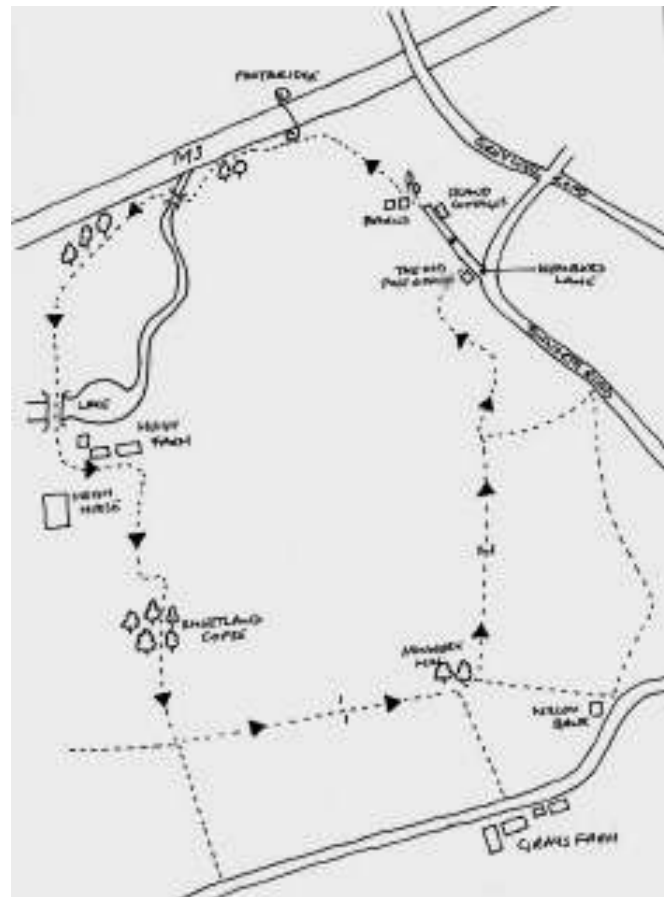
As you pass over the bridge, admire the beautiful lake to the left, which was formed from the original watercress beds; note the contemporary sculpture of an eagle on the lake side.

You can also see swans, mallards and the occasional heron. In the spring there is a lovely display of snowdrops and aconites.

Continue up the drive past the first farm cottages on the left and the stables to the right. A signpost directs you from the main private driveway towards the original farm buildings.

As you approach the farm gate there is a small crossroads, turn right opposite the black barn and follow the path, Huish House will now be on the right behind the trees.

Continue along the path until you come to an old



metal gate. Once through the gate (please close and secure) the path continues beside a post and rail fence on the left and a line of trees to the right. This field is normally home to some friendly black welsh mountain sheep (if you are walking with dogs please keep them under control).

At the end of the path you will come to another gate which leads on through to a well maintained grass path. Continue southeast along the grass path with the wire fence to the right, there are two bends in the path, first to the left and then the right just before entering Sheetland Copse.

This is a private wood, although the public footpath does run through a short section of it, please respect the owners and keep to the designated path, there are 'no entry' signs to show the private areas.

Once through Sheetland copse the path follows the hedgerow on the left, with views to the right across the fields towards Tunworth Down.

Approximately 200 metres along the path on the left there is a gap in the hedge which leads to a metal kissing gate. Through the gate the path continues directly across the field heading northeast back towards Mapledurwell village (occasionally sheep are kept in this field, so again if you are walking with dogs please keep them under control).

The path passes through a gap in the hedge and continues northeast towards Nunnery Hill, with the hedgerow to the left. At Nunnery trees the footpath heads north through the field until the stile, once over the stile, continue until you reach the tree lined hedge. Remain on the path, which runs along the field boundary.

The path bears to the left and then the right and finally brings you to a farm gate; on the right hand side of the gate there is pedestrian access to return into Kembers Lane.

Turn right and you are once again at your starting point on Tunworth Road.

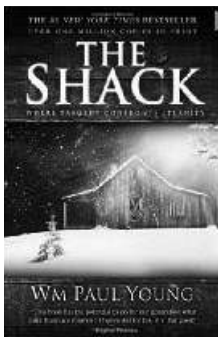
